A BILLIARD TOURNAMENT.

A grand billiard tournament, open to the billiard players of the world, is announced to take place at Chicago, commencing on Monday evening, Nov. 10, next, and continuing day and evening until finished. Prizes amounting to \$3,000 in cash are offered. The conditions regulating the tournament are as follows: The game will be the three-ball French carom, 400 points up each, on a five by ten carom table, with two and three-eighths inch balls. The winner of the greatest number of games will receive the first prize of \$1,000 and an emblem of superiority, which shall become his property and be held without conditions. The winner of the second greatest number of games will receive the second prize of \$750. The winner of the third greatest number of games will receive the third prize of \$550. The winner of the fourth greatest number of games will receive the fourth prize of \$450. The winner of the fifth greatest number of games will receive the fifth prize of \$350. Tables manufactured by the following firms will be alternately used: Stephani, Monheimer & Hart; J. M. Brunswick and Balke Co.; E. Brunswick & Co., and A. Zeller.
