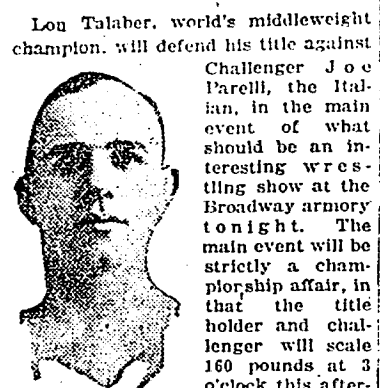


TALABER RISKS CROWN IN TILT WITH PARELLI

Interest in the Parelli-Rocco match is so keen tickets are being purchased in advance, an unusual situation for a wrestling bout at the west side theater.

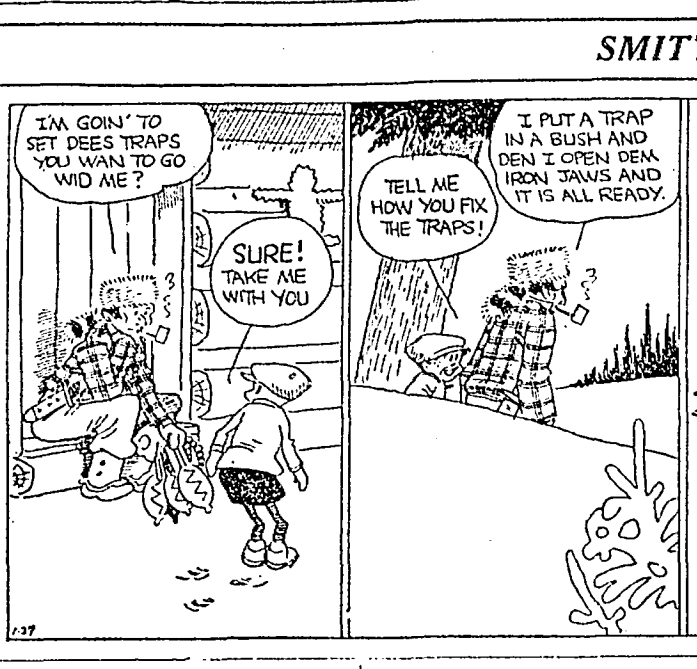

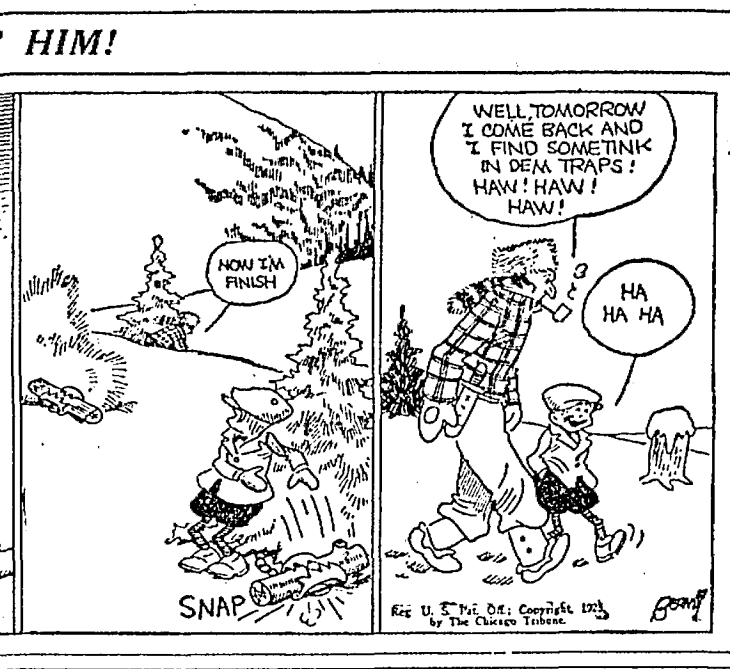

HERE'S DIFFERENCE BETWEEN HERRING AND RING BILL GULLS.

With all their "poetry of motion," the herring and ring-billed gulls, two birds that call Chicago their home at this time of the year, are anything but poetic in their feeding habits.

It is not easy to tell at all times the difference between the ring bill and herring. However, get them together and you can spot the herring gull at once because of his larger size, while the other species has a black band around its bill.

The immature gulls are sometimes mistaken for a different species, as their plumage is different from that of the older birds.

MUST BE EQUIPPED FOR LATE HATCHED CHICKS.

In discussing the hatchery business in this country at a poultrymen's conference held in Chicago a few days ago, Prof. W. Lapp, poultry specialist of the Iowa State college, said that farms are not adequately equipped to take care of the chicks hatched in June and July.

His experience and figures have proved, he believes, that the late hatched, slow developing, slow maturing chick is not profitably produced.

Talking issue with the men who are skeptical about the hatchery business, the Iowa poultry expert said, "There is a good field for the hatchery chick sold at the proper time."

Lightweight Tourney Lured Dundee Home, Manager Says

New York, Jan. 26.—Johnny Dundee, veteran Italian lightweight and former world's featherweight champion, came back to the United States to enter the lightweight elimination tournament and not to reclaim the featherweight title, James J. Johnston, Dundee's manager, said today.

Dundee never intended to reclaim the featherweight title which he voluntarily relinquished, Johnston said.

Johnston said he would go before the state athletic commission at its regular meeting tomorrow and seek reinstatement for Dundee as a featherweight and also to make plans for Dundee's entrance in the lightweight elimination tournament.

Members of the commission refused today to comment on the latest turn of affairs in the Dundee matter, other than to say that official notification of Dundee's suspension by the French boxing federation has been received.

Suspended by N. B. A. Baltimore, Md., Jan. 25.—The National Boxing Association of America has followed the example of the International Boxing union in suspending Johnny Dundee, former world's featherweight champion, for his failure to keep his agreement to meet Fred Bretton, French lightweight, Latrobe Cogswell, president of the American organization, announced here tonight.
