

BILLIARDS IN CHICAGO.

CHICAGO, Nov. 10.—The Billiard Tournament opened to-night. The first game, a three-ball carom, was between Dion and Snyder. The former won by a score of 400 to Snyder 272. Dion's best run was 34, and Snyder's, 45.

The second game was between Ubassy and Bessunger, the former winning by a score of 400 to Bessunger's 188. The best runs were Ubassy 69, Bessunger 36.

The Chicago billiard tournament at the three-ball carom game opened at the Music Hall to-night by a game between Joseph Dion, of New-York, and Peter Snyder, of Chicago. The games are all 400 points French caroms. Dion won on the sixty-seventh inning by a score of 400 to 272. Dion's average was 5 65-67. The largest runs were: Dion, 32 and 34; Snyder, 45 and 24. The second game was between François Ubassy and John Bessunger. Ubassy led from the start, piling up runs of 69, 65 and 68, and making double numbers in nearly every run. Bessunger's best play was at the close, when he ran 26, his largest score. Ubassy won in the thirty-first inning, the score being 400 to 187. The winner's average is 16 4-31. The game closed at 11:50 P. M. The game was played on the Brunswick table.

Four games will be played to-morrow—two in the afternoon and two at night. In the afternoon Cyrille Dion and Slosson, and Daly and Snyder will be the contestants. In the evening, Garnier and Bessunger, and Daly and Slosson will play.
