He has won eight straight. Greenleaf, who is 22 years old. tonight's match in eighteen innings, third shortest of the tournament. a high run 70, which stands of second to Bennie Allen's world's record run of 81, made in the present competi-tion. Ralph's high run was 22.

The youthful star outclassed his veteran opponent and had a high run of 70,

which started in the third frame. The run included all fourteen balls in the fourth, fifth, sixth, and seventh frames and nine balls in the eighth frame. This took all the heart out of Ralph and he missed shots after that which a tyro could have made with ease, Greenleaf winning by an unfinished run of 5 in the fourteenth frame. This victory gave Greenleaf eight consecutive triumphs. Keogh and Allen are tied for second place, each having won slx games and lost two. They will meet tomorrow in the final match of their schedule. There is a triple tie for fourth place between Louis D. Krueter, New York, Concannon, and Seaback. They have com-

pleted their schedules and each has

five victories to his credit and four defeats. John M. Layton, Columbia, Missouri, stands seventh, Maturo is eighth, Ralph ninth, and Morris D. Fink, Philadelphia, tenth. Layton won three games and lost five. He still has one to play, but the result will not change the standing. Maturo won three and lost six, Ralph won two and lost seven, while Fink won but one of his nine matches. Greenleaf has one more game to play, meeting John M. Layton of Missouri tomorrow evening in the final match of the tourney, but even if Layton should pull the unexpected and stop the sensational youngster, the title still goes to Greenleaf, as both of his nearest op-ponents, Bennie Allen and Jerome Keogh, have lost two games.
